Welcome to 2019! 2018 was filled with joys and sorrows, but throughout it all, we Altrusans maintained our love of SERVICE. For the next 3 issues of our newsletter, let's think about our role of service in the Dayton community.

In reviewing background for this article, I found a piece written by then International Service chair, Carol Latham, 2006. Carol reminded us all that there are 3 major factors that distinguish one area service organization from another:

- 1. The actual service that is available
- 2. The quality of the service provided
- 3. The way in which members treat each other, treat potential members and the manner in which they interact with their area community...this might be titled "TLC"!

Heads Up Altrusans A Couple of Volunteer Opportunities at Cleveland School in January

Listening Volunteers Needed: Mrs. Hormann, Principal at Cleveland, asked if there are any Altrusans who would be interested in supporting some of our students by listening to them read for 15 min - 1/2 hr., once or twice a week. Cleveland's hours are from 7:10 - 2:10. Depending upon the time you prefer, students who fit your schedule would be matched to you. I believe that 3rd grade is the priority.

Volunteers Needed to Run Stations at Event: Celebrate Reading Together is an event to be held on *Jan. 17th at 1:00 in Cleveland's cafeteria*. We'll be inviting pre-k students and their parents as a part of the STAR (Sit Together and Read) Ohio Early Literacy initiative. STAR encourages print awareness for young children. The teacher presents a story, and then the book is sent home for parents to read to their child. Our event will feature the first 4 books of the program with stations for an activity that goes along with each book. Stations include making a movable giraffe to go along with the story, <u>Giraffes Can't Dance</u>; throwing garbage props into a garbage truck for the book, <u>I Stink!</u>; planting seeds in little cups to go with <u>Vegetable Soup</u>, and using grocery ads to make a shopping list for <u>To Market</u>, <u>To Market</u>. We'll also have a small snack station and a parent/child reading station. Please contact Mary Reed if interested in helping at Cleveland.



COMMITTEE REPORTS


<u>Communication Committee</u> (Diane Noonan)
