December's Community Speaker at Membership Meeting

Sonja Pluck, Director of Madison Adult Career Center, was our speaker at the December lunch meeting. She thanked those who voted to pass the levy and explained the motto for the career center:

Bring your "A" Game to work:

Attitude, Attendance, Appearance, Ambition, Accountability, Acceptance, Appreciation. Sonja went on to share with the group some other details on their programs and how Altrusa's scholarship donations help students complete their career goals. Here are the highlights of those programs:

- Workforce and Personal Interest classes ranging from computer use to herb gardening.
- Adult Diploma Program students can earn GED and other certifications. There are over 8,000 people in Richland County who are without a GED or a high school diploma.
- Training for Employers, i.e., welding at their location
- Financial Aid programs are available, including Altrusa's scholarships.
- A Student Advocate and Community Health worker is available for the students.

Classes are held at Madison Comprehensive High School at night. Last year, 115 students graduated from their programs. The student Cosmetology School can be reached at 419-589-6363. Let them practice on you! Scholarships are awarded to students by our Club based on the Altrusa Principles.


Community Service

Empty Stockings: A Brooklyn Christmas Tale





Denis Hamill, author of Empty Stockings: A Brooklyn Christmas Tale

Several years ago, I started a tradition of picking up Christmas novels during the holiday season. It soon became such a tradition that my mother and sister would gift me such books as birthday gifts in early December.

That tradition all started with one book - *Empty Stockings: A Brooklyn Christmas Tale*, written by Denis Hamill. My collection of Christmas novels has grown considerably over the years, however, I make sure to always read this particular story. It's filled with all of the emotions and feelings that the holiday season inevitably offers us - joy, hope, peace, but also sadness, frustration, and disappointment. Such is the human experience! If you're looking for a great read during the holiday season, I recommend you find a copy of *Empty Stockings: A Brooklyn Christmas Tale*, by Denis Hamill.

A summary from Amazon.com:

"Christmas 1963. A nation mourns the loss of its president. A young boy mourns the life his Irish-Catholic, working-class father never had.

Rory Maguire is a fourteen-year-old boy looking for a better life for himself and his family in Brooklyn, New York. His father, Harry, had a terrible accident that cost him his job, his ability to walk, and his dignity. His brother, Dermot, is hanging out with a local gang called the Shamrocks, and his two little sisters are growing hungry in the Maguires' frigid tenement apartment. Rory's dreams of becoming a writer seem hopelessly out of reach, as does winning the heart of Carol, the daughter of a prominent Brooklyn lawyer. What Rory needs most this Christmas is a miracle -- and even though he can't bring his hero John F. Kennedy back to life, he might be able to give his father, an ex-merchant marine, the recognition he deserves...and offer his family the gift of hope, health, and happiness for years to come.

In *Empty Stockings*, Denis Hamill captures the romance, strife, and spirit of the urban Irish-American experience. A heartwarming tale for all seasons, it is a gift to treasure and behold."

Member Spotlight - Jenni Paramore

Mansfield native, Jenni Paramore, was born and raised here and she graduated from Mansfield Senior High in 1967.

She is one of five children, although she and her sister Judy are the only two still living. Her younger sister died quite young due to leukemia and a heart issue, and her younger brother passed away in his late 20s due to a hereditary heart disease. Although she lost some of her siblings at young ages, her parents lived a good long life. Jenni's mother passed away at 88 and her father at 93. Jenni said that "my mother was the kindest person I have ever known, and my father was a hard worker and a jokester."

Jenni has two rescue dogs - Zoey, a labradoodle, and Ziggy who is a rescue from a puppy mill. They were brought home 20 days apart in July 2018. They also have two rescue cats - Archie, a long haired tuxedo, and his brother Jughead, a short haired 'almost' tuxedo - he has a white spot on his chest and the tip of his tail. Jenni said, "I discovered them on the bike trail along with four of their siblings. They had been dumped there and were very domesticated, not feral. Their siblings now live in Mansfield, Galion, Shelby and Tennessee. They are seven years old."

For work, Jenni is the Community Outreach Manager for Directions Credit Union, with no current plans to retire.

When asked about what she does in our community, Jenni said, "my job at the Credit Union allows me the opportunity to support many community projects. We also have several well-established Financial Literacy programs - in person and virtual. In 2022 we reached a combined 22,000 adults and children with our literacy endeavors."

As a hobby, Jenni loves to quilt, and she even belongs to a local quilt group.



Jenni joined Altrusa because of the Tools for Schools program. She has a strong belief in supporting teachers in the schools in our community.

She joined our club in 2022 with Peggy Harrison and Lisa Duckworth as her sponsors.

When asked what is one thing that you'd like your fellow Altrusans to know about you, Jenni responded, "I am not a particularly social person and not good at large social gatherings. I am at my best when I am in charge of a gathering/presentation, or at least have an assigned task."

Member Spotlight - Marilyn McFarland

Marilyn McFarland was born in Dover, Ohio but grew up in the North Canton area, where she graduated from Massillon Jackson High School. Her father was an employee of Lumberman's Insurance Company and was transferred to their home office here in Mansfield, between her Freshman and Sophomore years of college. That's how she ended up in Mansfield. Marilyn spent her freshman year at the Kent State Branch in Canton, her sophomore year at OSU-Mansfield (the year her family moved to Mansfield), and her junior and senior years were at the Kent State main campus. After graduation, she moved back in with her parents until securing a full-time teaching job.

Marilyn was an only child growing up. She married her husband Bill (Lucas native) in 1985 and they have a son Brandon who is married to Jessie (who live in McKinney, Texas) and a daughter Emily who is married to Matt (who live in Cincinnati). They have 4 grandchildren: her Texas grands are Will who is nine and Ensley who is seven, and her Buckeye grands are Mia who is four and Casey who is two.

Marilyn and Bill had a family dog for 13 years whose name was Lacy Lu. They rescued her from a shopping cart in downtown Toledo. Marilyn also said, "our young children had pulled all of their piggy bank money together and handed us a bag of money for an anniversary gift so WE could buy THEM a dog!" Marilyn and Bill presently have no pets, however, they do have "critters" that are a result of living in the country! Marilyn said, "I love seeing all of my deer babies, wild turkeys, beautiful birds (including eagles), but I'm not too thrilled about seeing the raccoons, groundhogs and coyotes! Our neighbors at Tucker Creek Farm (my husband's homestead) have quite a few animals that we visit regularly, especially when the grandchildren are around."

Marilyn has been happily retired from Education/Teaching for 10 years. Her teaching career began in this area, in the Ontario School System, and ended in the Woodmore School District in Northwest Ohio. Over the 35+ in education, she taught Kindergarten through 4th grade with the last 22 years of her career in Kindergarten.

Besides being an active member of Altrusa for the past seven years, Marilyn volunteers at The New Store, manages The United Way Big Red Bookshelf at the Lucas Community Center, volunteers as a "personal shopper" at the Lucas Food Pantry, helps organize fundraisers for the Lucas Lions, oversees the Care and Share Program at Pleasant Valley Lutheran Church in addition to singing in the church choir, volunteers as needed at Lucas Elementary, is a substitute teacher for LifeWise Academy, and has been a summer VBS preschool teacher for several years.

Marilyn enjoys community involvement, traveling, interior design, shopping and dining out, playing games, putting together 1000 piece jigsaw puzzles, reading children's literature, Musicals, and singing. (and of course...chocolate and coffee!)



Marilyn joined Altrusa because of the community service projects that were presented at the time and the passion exhibited from it's members. She said, "they seemed like a fun group of ladies! Being a retired educator and relocating back to the Mansfield area, this organization seemed to be a perfect fit. Plus...Kathy Shambre can be pretty convincing!"

Marilyn joined our club in 2016 with Barb Huston and Kathy Shambre as her Sponsors.

When asked about something that she'd like her fellow Altrusans to know about her, Marilyn responded, "Music has always been a big part of my life. At a very young age I was singing in church, playing records in my room and singing along with the musical hits. During the Christmas holiday, my family would all be assigned vocal parts, and we would sing Handel's Messiah cover to cover (just for fun). In High School I played Ermengarde in the musical Hello Dolly, was in Acapella Choir and the select ensemble, the Jacks 'n Jills. In college I sang with the Kent State Madrigal Singers and The Ohio State University Singers of which we had the opportunity to tour Europe for 3 weeks in a Youth Choral Festival. Locally, I have sung with the Mansfield Choral Society. I found music to be an asset throughout my teaching career. Kids learn through singing! I now sing in my very small church choir. We have a total of four: myself, another member, the organist and the pastor! I recently acquired a piano and who knows... playing 'Chopsticks,' (definitely no concerts), may be in my musical future!"
